Brief Course Synopsis:

In recent decades, pop culture journalism has become a seemingly inexhaustible source of information and opinion on every aspect of popular culture. Anyone with interests in the arts can enjoy almost instant access from their laptop to commentary on their favorite works of film, television, theatre, fiction, music, etc. While some pop culture journalism is admittedly infotainment that does little to challenge us, pop culture writing at its best can help to elucidate the fundamental importance of the arts in our era of uncertainty and social upheaval. This semester we will particularly focus on a number of examples of pop culture journalism that make sophisticated, if problematic, use of the first person voice. Commentary on a range of popular arts will be explored, including music, cinema and television.

Methods of Evaluation and Weight:

Seminar presentation – 20% Midterm – 20% Article Proposal – 10% (approximately 1000 words). Seminar Journal – 20 % Article - 30 % (approximately 3000 words). Texts and/or Resources Required (e.g. Internet access, specific textbook title, lab kit, etc.)

Course Readings will be accessible via the Web. No textbook purchases will be required.
