Brief Course Synopsis (subject to change):

With an emphasis on craft, this seminar addresses fundamentals of screenwriting through writing, reading, and viewing assignments and exercises; and the ongoing workshopping of students' creative work from initial idea conception to execution on the page. Topics include: story structure, theme, character development, story lines, scene construction, synopsis writing and pitching, script and film analysis, and options for further training and development. Teaching materials will be drawn from film, television, digital media, and popular video culture; learning activities and assignments will principally consist of short-form screenplays and technical aspects of the discipline.

Students will be working consistently, individually and in small groups, on: breakdowns of increasing detail and precision of TV shows, films, and screenplays; the writing and rewriting of short film scripts and scenes; the evaluation of each other's informal and formal ideas and drafts; the process-oriented (over product-oriented) practice of rewriting and revision; and preparation for an original feature-length screenplay.

<u>Full participation</u> in <u>all</u> collaborative course activities, reflective of an inescapably collective and labour-intensive discipline, is needed to pass this course.
