Course Description

This course will provide students with an overview of the systematic study of the public sector. We will look at the public sector from many different angles, and study topics such as public goods, externalities, income redistribution and taxation, elections, politicians, legislative bargaining, parties, and interest groups. More than provide an exhaustive overview of the field of public economics, this course is designed to familiarize students with methods used to study this field and to get into the habit of reading academic journal articles and introduce them to conducting research.

Students are required to have solid background knowledge of microeconomic theory.

Important Information

Research Proposal	Discuss a research project that you think is worthwhile doing. The proposal needs to include a clear statement of the research question, a discussion of the previous literature, why this is an important extension of the previous literature and a statement of the expected findings. Note that you do not actually have to do the research. About 3 pates single spaced, font 11. More information will be handed out separately.		
Paper Reports	Each student selects 2 papers relating to the topics of the course (not necessarily from the course outline) and writes a report about the paper in form of a referee report. The chosen paper has to contain original research. It cannot be a literature overview, an opinion piece, a newspaper article, etc. The paper report has to be given before that specific paper is discussed in class. More information will be handed out separately.		
Late and Missing Assignments	It is the student's responsibility to meet the requirements of the course in a timely manner. If a student has a verifiable and legitimate excuse for a late or missed assignment, the student has to discuss with the instructor how this assignment will be handled.		
Communication and Office Hours	Besides the course website, I will occasionally use <i>email</i> as a means of communication with the students. Students are expected check their <i>uoguelph</i> account regularly. I will typically answer emails within 48hrs, but should not be expected to answer emails over the weekend. I will be available for students during my office hours and by appointment.
