Calendar Description

This course extends calculus to cover functions of a complex variable; it introduces complex variable techniques which are very useful for mathematics, the physical sciences and engineering. Topics include complex differentiation, planar mappings, analytic and harmonic functions, contour integration, Taylor and Laurent series, the residue calculus and its application to the computation of trigonometric and improper integrals, conformal mapping and the Dirichlet problem.

Grading Schemes

Your best 9 of the 11 weekly assignments will constitute your assignment mark. In general, if you miss an assignment for any valid reason (illness, etc.) then that will be one of the assignments dropped from the set. Speak to me if you miss more than two assignments for valid reasons.

If you do better in the final exam than on the midterm test, then the exam will be weighted at 50% and the midterm test at 25%, otherwise the exam will be weighted at 40% and the midterm test at 35%.

Last Day to Drop Course

The final day to drop Winter 2024 courses without academic penalty is the last day of classes: April 08

After this date, a mark will be recorded, whether course work is completed or not (a zero is assigned for missed tests/assignments). This mark will show on the student's transcript and will be calculated into their average.

Course Grading Policies

Submission of Assignments

Assignments must be submitted in class on Wednesdays. Late assignments will not be accepted. If possible, assignments will be graded and returned by Friday of the same week. It is the student's responsibility to ensure the marks recorded on the course web page are accurate.

Reassessment

Drop Date
