Calendar Description

The purpose of this course is to help students understand the socio-historical and theoretical context of modern psychological research and practice. This includes: 1) evaluating basic assumptions underlying modern psychology by drawing on historical, theoretical and philosophical perspectives, and 2) investigating historical and current controversies within psychology. Topics may include the question of psychology's scientific status, the assumptions embedded in psychological theory and research methodology, social constructionism, free will/agency, and the relations between psychology, power, ethics, and politics.

Course Description

In this course, you will develop your own unique view on the status of our discipline. Your view will be informed by learning about the history of our discipline and various critical perspectives on our discipline. In a typical class, the instructor will make prefatory remarks and then there will be small group discussion. You will be evaluated on the quality of your contributions to group discussions and your performance on two in-class written exams (essay style questions). This course involves A LOT OF READING and PREPARATION.

Assessment Breakdown

Each class, except for the first class and the two in-class exam days, there will be new readings to be discussed. Those readings, or references for them, will be posted on CourseLink at least a week in advance, and they will be common to all students. READ and RE-READ those readings. You will be expected to know them in-depth. In addition, you are REQUIRED to bring to class ONE ADDITIONAL READING, related to that day's topic, which you find particularly interesting and insightful. The small group discussions will be enriched by students sharing what they found with their fellow group members.

The quality of participation in small group discussions will be assessed in the following way:

0% = Did Not Contribute in a Meaningful Way

100% = Contributed in a Meaningful Way

110% = Contributed in an Extraordinary Way

125% = Consistently Contributed in an Extraordinary Way

The instructor and teaching assistants will make notes on the quality of your contributions throughout the semester. Please keep in mind that quality of contribution is not the same as frequency of contribution. In addition, giving space for your fellow group members to contribute, and asking good questions of them, is as important as what you say. Formal feedback will be given halfway through the semester. Occasional absences will not affect your mark. A chronic pattern of absences could affect your mark. In such cases, please contact the instructor to discuss your particular situation.

The In-Class Exams will be written exams in essay style. You can write them on CourseLink with your browser locked down or you can write them by hand

Last Day to Drop Course

After this date, a mark will be recorded, whether course work is completed or not (a zero is assigned for missed tests/assignments). This mark will show on the student's transcript and will be calculated into their average.

CSAHS Academic Misconduct Policy

The Academic Misconduct Policy is detailed in the Undergraduate Calendar. The University of Guelph is committed to upholding the highest standards of academic integrity and it is the responsibility of all members of the University community – faculty, staff, and students – to be aware of what constitutes academic misconduct and to do as much as possible to prevent academic offences from occurring. University of Guelph students have the responsibility of abiding by the University's policy on academic misconduct regardless of their location of study; faculty, staff and students have the responsibility of supporting an environment that discourages misconduct. Students need to remain aware that instructors have access to and the right to use electronic and other means of detection.

Whether or not a student intended to commit academic misconduct is not relevant for a finding of guilt. Hurried or careless submission of assignments does not excuse students from responsibility for verifying the academic integrity of their work before submitting it. Students who are in any doubt as to whether an action on their part could be construed as an academic offence should consult with a faculty member or faculty advisor.



Instructors shall not determine if academic misconduct has occurred. This is up to the Associate Dean Academic's office. Instructors shall not assign a grade of zero even if they believe that the student has committed some form of academic misconduct (e.g., copied material from a website like CourseHero) on an assignment or exam.

Instructors <u>can</u> determine if a student has poorly paraphrased and/or improperly cited material and can provide a grade accordingly as long as this is clearly identified as part of the assessment criteria via a rubric or other assessment tools.

Accessibility

The University promotes the full participation of students who experience disabilities in their academic programs. To that end, the provision of academic accommodation is a shared responsibility between the University and the student.

When accommodations are needed, the student is required to first register with Student Accessibility Services (SAS). Documentation to substantiate the existence of a disability is required; however, interim accommodations may be possible while that process is underway.

Accommodations are available for both permanent and temporary disabilities. It should be noted that common illnesses such as a cold or the flu do not constitute a disability. Use of the SAS Exam Centre requires students to make a booking at least 10 days in advance, and no later than the first business day in November, March or July as appropriate for the semester. Similarly, new or changed accommodations for online quizzes, tests and exams must be approved at least a week ahead of time. Drop Date

This applies to all undergraduate students except for Doctor of Veterinary Medicine and Associate Diploma in Veterinary Technology (conventional and alternative delivery) students.
