## **Course Content**

#### **Specific Learning Outcomes:**

- **Critical and Creative Thinking:** Students will be encouraged to think about a specific research topic from different perspectives, as well as evaluate the process of drawing conclusions in psychological research. This is an invaluable tool that allows students to judge the merit of any new piece of information they learn, whether in psychology or another field.
- **Literacy:** In addition to understanding key concepts from the text and weekly lectures, students will achieve quantitative literacy by interpreting numerical data in various formats (tables, graphs, charts).
- **Communicating:** Students will be guided through the process of expressing a research idea in written form, either using a verbal description or presenting their ideas in a figure or table format. Students will also become familiar with the Courselink system as a means of communicating with the class, accessing lecture slides and grades, and completing assignments. Students will also be reminded about the best way to communicate via email.
- **Professional and Ethical Behaviour:** Students will learn about the ethical principles that form the foundation of psychological research and practice. They will also act in a way that shows academic integrity, and will manage their time and plan in advance to complete the many responsibilities of being a student.

The lectures will not simply regurgitate what is in the text, and the slides alone will *not* provide sufficient detail to succeed on an exam. If you miss a class, you are responsible for getting the material that you missed.

- MyPsychLab: MyPsychLab is a collection of online resources that comes with your text to help you learn the content, but none of it is required to earn grades for this course. #### **Grading Policies**

- online assignments: You will have the opportunity to complete six online assignments that you can access through Courselink (under the 'Quizzes' tab). Each assignment is worth 4% of your final grade, and only the top 5 assignments will count. Each assignment covers material for two chapters and is due the Friday immediately following the coverage of the material. These assignments will help you focus on the important concepts and once completed, will be a useful study tool for you. Note: You will **NOT** have access to the online assignments after the due date unless you complete at least one question on them.

You will be given many opportunities to look over your work before you submit, and you should save your work often. You will be allowed multiple attempts and unlimited time to work on each assignment. I will grade your LAST attempt so make sure that it is your best attempt.

You will have access to these assignments from the first day of class and they can be completed at any time. The answers will be posted immediately after the due date. As such, there is no valid excuse for submitting a late assignment (this includes computer, courselink, and internet problems), and any assignments not completed by the due date will automatically be assigned a grade of 0. You are encouraged to complete the assignments well before the due date to avoid any such problems.

- paper: You will complete the Paper individually, and it is worth 7% of your final grade. Papers must be submitted to the Dropbox on Courselink no later than Friday, October 16<sup>th</sup> by 11:59 pm. Papers arriving after that time will be considered late, and will be deducted 5% per 24-hour period. The papers should be no longer than 2 pages, 12-point Times New Roman font, double-spaced, with 1 inch margins and no cover page. Your name and student number can be outside the margins on the top right as a header. See the Paper Grade Sheet under the Content tab on Courselink for a detailed grading scheme.

The purpose of the Paper is to become more familiar with the type of research methods that psychologists use. In completing this assignment, you will become more aware of the extraneous variables, strengths and weaknesses, and proper controls involved in research. These tools will provide you with the foundation to evaluate and understand any psychological research.

You will be assigned your topic the first week of class. Topic assignments will go by last name, and will be posted on the discussion board. Students will earn 0 if they hand in a paper on a different topic.

To submit your paper using the Dropbox, click on the 'Dropbox' tab on Courselink and then on the dropbox folder titled 'Paper Dropbox'. On the following page, click on 'Add File', browse your computer for your file, click 'Upload' and 'Submit'.

- midterm: There will be one in-class midterm on November 3<sup>rd</sup> consisting of 60 multiple-choice questions that will be based on the lecture material and module readings. You will be allowed 80 minutes to complete the midterm. Practice questions and other study aids that accompany the text can be found at MyPsychLab. You midterm will not be returned to you, nor will we have time to go over

them in class. Please contact our TA Sulan Kith (<u>skith@uoguelph.ca</u>) if you want to review your midterm. You will find your grades on Courselink.

If extenuating circumstances arise (medical or compassionate reasons) and you have official documentation of the problem that occurred on the date of the midterm, then email me immediately and bring me your documentation as soon as you're able (you can bring it to class or leave it in my mailbox on the 4<sup>th</sup> floor MacK). A make up midterm session is scheduled for Thursday, November 5<sup>th</sup> from 5:30 - 6:50 pm in room MCKN 304. If you cannot make that time, please email TA Sulan Kith at <u>skith@uoguelph.ca</u> to arrange a different time. If you are unable to write the make up midterm by Friday November 6<sup>th</sup> due to an extended illness or problem, then your final exam will be weighed more heavily (it will count for 70% of your final grade). If you do not provide documentation, you will receive a 0 on the midterm. There are NO exceptions to these rules.

You **MUST** write your exams (midterm and final exam) in the section of PSYC\*1000 in which you are registered (section 03 at 7:00pm for you). Although there would be some similar content across the different sections of PSYC\*1000, each section covers different content and the exams are different. Also, there are only enough seats for the people registered our section of PSYC\*1000 to write the midterm, and other sections are just as full. Anyone who is found writing a midterm or final exam in the wrong section will automatically earn 0 on that exam.

- final exam: The final exam will be held on December 12<sup>th</sup> from 7-9 pm. You will have 2 hours to answer 100 multiple choice questions that will be based on the lectures and assigned module readings. The exam will be cumulative, but it will be weighed most heavily on the content covered after the midterm.

If extenuating circumstances arise (medical or compassionate reasons) and you cannot write the final exam as scheduled, then you need to contact your program head and petition to write a deferred exam (these usually take place in February). It is a good idea to acquire official documentation for missing the exam, to help you petition your case for deferral.

- research participation: Volunteering as a participant in a study can deepen your understanding of the research that is going on in your own department, and you are encouraged to participate if you see a study that interests you. You can earn up to 3% toward your final grade by participating in research. To find out how to sign up for studies, read the 'SONA Research Participation Instructions for Students' Handout on Courselink (you'll find it under the 'Content' tab).

This system for signing up for research is administered by <u>ppadmin@uoguelph.ca</u>. Please contact this address for help with any problems with signing up for research, as *your TAs and I have no access or control over this aspect of the course*.

If you don't find studies that interest you, then you can earn up to 3% toward your final grade by writing up to three papers (they're each worth 1%). So you may choose to participate in two studies and write one paper, or write two papers and participate in one study, or whatever combination of papers and participation that earns you 3%. Please see the 'SONA Alternate Assignment for Research Participation' Handout for more information on these alternate assignments (also under the 'Content' tab).
